The relationship between the two disciplines resembles that of the rules of grammar to a language, or of logic to philosophy. *Usūl al-Fiqh* in this sense provides the standard criteria for the correct deduction of the rulings of *fiqh* from the sources of *Shari'ah* (the *Qur'an* and *Sunnah*).
